Black Cultural Zone Receives \$28 Million to Build Liberation Park Affordable Housing in East Oakland

Oakland, CA (January 16, 2025): The Black Cultural Zone Community Development Corporation (BCZ CDC) is pleased to have been awarded \$28 million dollars of Measure U funding for Liberation Park Residences, a groundbreaking project to create new affordable housing for East Oakland residents.

Oakland, CA – The City of Oakland's Housing and Community Development Department (Oakland HCD) today announced the award of \$28 million to the Black Cultural Zone for the development of Liberation Park Residences.

Located at 7101 Foothill Blvd. in City Council District 6, Liberation Park Residences is a key component of the broader Black Cultural Zone initiative, which aims to revitalize

East Oakland through economic development, cultural preservation, and community empowerment.

"This significant investment in the Black Cultural Zone marks a major step forward in our efforts to address the urgent need for affordable housing in Oakland," said Mayor Kevin Jenkins. "Liberation Park Residences will not only provide vital housing for vulnerable residents but also contribute to the revitalization of East Oakland and the flourishing of the Black Cultural Zone."

The City of Oakland received 24 applications for its 2024-2025 New Construction of Multifamily Affordable Housing Notice of Funding Availability (New Construction NOFA). Five projects were ultimately selected for funding, with awards ranging from \$7 million to \$28 million. City funding sources for the \$80.5 million NOFA is largely made up of Measure U, the Oakland voter-approved 2022 housing and infrastructure bond measure.

"Investments into deeply affordable housing are the core of our work," said Emily Weinstein, Oakland's Director of Housing and Community Development. "The awarded projects, including Liberation Park Residences, will bring us closer to serving Oakland's homeless and low-income families and combating the city's housing crisis."

The City of Oakland is actively working to address the housing crisis through a multipronged approach, including the development of new affordable housing units, the preservation of existing affordable housing, and the prevention of homelessness.
